**Step 2:** An energy expert arrives at your home.




**Step 3:** The expert shows you what is using the most power.

Step 5: An Action Plan is sent to you with more ways to save power and make your home more comfortable.







## NOT-FOR-PROFIT PROMOTION GRANTS

Funding is available for not-for-profit organisations to help NSW households Save Power

#### What is the Home Power Savings Program?

The \$63 million Home Power Savings Program offers 220,000 low income households across NSW free help to save on power bills and reduce carbon pollution.

Households receive a free home energy assessment, a Power Savings Kit worth around \$200 and a personal Action Plan.

The program is funded until June 2013.

#### Who is eligible?

Centrelink, Pensioner, Concession or Low Income Health Care aard holders. Department of Vetersans' Affains-Pensioner or Repatriation Heath (Gold or White) card holders, social housing tenants and energy utility hardship customers.

Molinda from Tolarah's average daily power use has dropped 20% since joining the program. She is expected to save at least \$250 a year from hor Power Savings Kit. Grants are being offered by the Office of Environment and Heritage (OEH) to help not-for-profit organisations increase awareness and uptake of the NSW Home Power Savings Program through promotion of the program to:


- Eligible low income clients
- Motivated clients who are likely to realise the greatest power savings
- Clients who have the greatest need for the Program.

The grant amount will be calculated according to the size (organisational structure), audience reach, geographic coverage and potential set up costs (base funding) that will be required to implement the project and overcome current barriers to promoting the program.

#### Eligible local promotion activities

The grants are designed to assist organisations to train and equip front-line staff with information and resources to enable them to promote the program to established networks and through existing services and activities.

Grant recipients will receive a free Promotion Pack\* to support funded activities.



#### Internal

- Use of the Promotion Pack to deliver training sessions to frontline staff
- Continuous supply of co-branded posters and flyers to frontline centres.

#### External

- Issuing of a joint media release to local media
- Promotion of the program through newsletters and websites
- Supplying brochures to eligible dients, local employment offices, opportunity shops, and community centres
- Using the Promotion Pack to explain the program's benefits to groups of eligible clients.

# Cut costs and avoid large bills

LIVERPOOL resident Rita Connell has managed to cut about \$420 from her electricity bill per quarter.

An now she's looking to reduce it even further.

"The Home Power Savings Program taught me and my children how to be more efficient with our energy use," Ms Connell said.

While the State Government program has set Ms Connell up with good habits, she feels there's more savings to be had.

"They advised to shop around and get a better deal with the energy companies," she said.

After negotiating with her provider, the single mother became aware of another program and said she has become more thrifty.

One Big Switch if it means I can get a better deal," Ms Connell said. Those who sign up can be

offered a discount from a retailer to "switch", but their existing retailer might make a counter offer to avoid losing the business.

"People don't realise you can save just by filling the kettle half way, I owe a lot to my two girls who turn off the appliances at the mains when it's time for bed," she said.




